Valentine's Day, also called Saint Valentine's Day or the Feast of Saint Valentine, is celebrated annually on February 14. It originated as a Christian feast day honoring a martyr named Valentine, and through later folk traditions it has also become a significant cultural, religious and commercial celebration of romance and love in many regions of the world. During the 18th and 19th centuries, the tradition of giving Valentine's Day cards as a romantic gesture began to spread. At this time, they were usually handmade, with people decorating them with lace and ribbons. They often included sentimental messages, poems, or even secret declarations of love. The symbol most commonly associated with Valentine's Day is the heart, which represents love and affection; people widely recognize the heart shape as a symbol of romantic love, particularly on Valentine's Day.

Georgia Arbor Day is February 21, 2025

Georgia Arbor Day is a day set aside to plant, celebrate, and recognize trees for the benefits they provide. Ways to celebrate Georgia Arbor Day:

- Hold a tree planting ceremony
- Work with your city or Georgia Forestry Commission forester to make your community a Tree City USA
- Honor the good stewards in your community
- Give an award to an outstanding neighborhood garden, citizen group, or developer supporting "tree-friendly" values
- Schedule homeowner classes on tree pruning, tree selection, tree identification, and tree planting.
- Buy a tree to plant on public property in honor of someone or something

Groundhog Day - Feb. 2, 2025

The first Groundhog Day celebration in Punxsutawney on February 2, 1887, was the brainchild of local newspaper editor Clymer Freas, who sold a group of businessmen and groundhog hunters on the idea. The Punxsutawney Groundhog Club, as these men were known, trekked to a site called Gobbler's Knob, where the inaugural groundhog became the bearer of bad news when he saw his shadow. While sunny winter days are associated with colder, drier air, the groundhog probably shouldn't replace meteorologists for predicting the weather. Studies by the National Climatic Data Center and the Canadian Weather Service have given Punxsutawney Phil a dismal success rate of around 30 percent.

President's Day - February 17th

On the third Monday in February, the United States celebrates the federal holiday, Presidents' Day. Ironically, neither Congress nor the President has ever stipulated that the name of the federal holiday observed as Washington's Birthday be changed to Presidents' Day. Congress has never declared it a national holiday binding in all the states, which is why not all states celebrate Presidents Day.

Black History Month

The story of Black History Month began in 1915, half a century after the Thirteenth Amendment abolished slavery in the United States. That September, the Harvard-trained historian Carter G. Woodson and the prominent minister Jesse E. Moorland founded the Association for the Study of Negro Life and History (ASNLH), an organization dedicated to researching and promoting achievements by Black Americans and other peoples of African descent. The group sponsored a national Negro History Week in 1926, choosing the second week of February to coincide with the birthdays of Abraham Lincoln and Frederick Douglass. The event inspired schools and communities nationwide to organize local celebrations, establish history clubs, and host performances and lectures. President Gerald Ford officially recognized Black History Month in 1976, calling upon the public to "seize the opportunity to honor the too-often neglected accomplishments of Black Americans in every area of endeavor throughout our history."


Woman's Heart Week and National Wear Red Day - the first week of February

Although the stone has various colors, red is the best known. The word "garnet" originates from the Latin word "granatus," meaning seeds. This is likely because of the color of pomegranate seeds and the stone's seed like appearance.

February's amethyst birthstone is said to strengthen relationships and give its wearer courage. At one time, only royalty could wear the gem. The ancient Greeks thought that the amethyst guarded against intoxication.

Teen Dating Violence Awareness Month

The 2025 theme for TDVAM is "Respect That." Selected by the Love is Respect Youth Council, "Respect That" is a powerful concept that can transform relationships. Respecting someone isn't just a vague idea; it's an action and a mindset. The theme "Respect That" highlights the importance of treating partners with dignity, listening to their viewpoints, respecting their boundaries, and valuing their autonomy by focusing on "respect."

Teen dating violence is an often-unrecognized subcategory of domestic violence. Adolescents have been long overlooked as a population that suffers from relationship abuse. Romantic relationships between teenagers are incredibly complicated. The undertaking of a relationship, very often, requires more maturity than most teens have developed. These relationships are more likely to have problems, including communication, jealousy, and selfishness. As a result, teenagers are more likely to be involved in relationships that are unhealthy, violent, and abusive.
